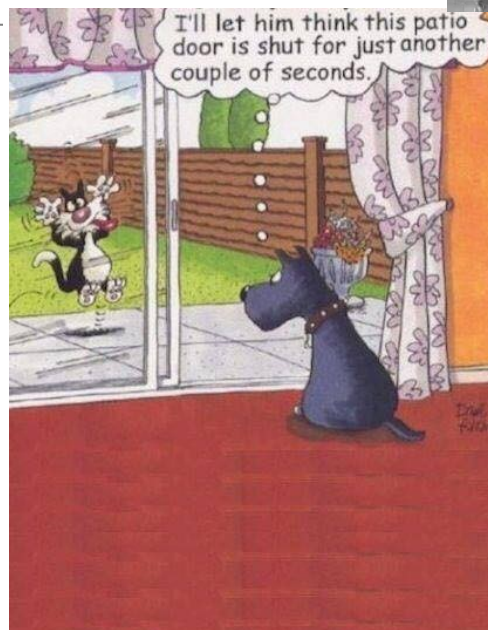

A Trip to the South Olives and tourism in tandem

A COUPLE OF MONTHS AGO, I introduced you to Evdokia, an olive tree that grows beside the Corfu Trail on the edge of the village of Strongili in Central South Corfu. Studies have established that this tree is up to 1,200 years old.

But it seems Evdokia is merely a 'poster girl' for ancient olives. Further south, in a more inaccessible location at the village of Argyrades, stands a tree that may be 400 years older. I learnt this from the Mavroudis family, who run an olive press (amongst other initiatives) near Vranganiotika, a small village not far from Argyrades, just south of Messongi.

Like Apostolos Patounis and his soap, the Mavroudis brothers have a passion for their product. A passion which has driven them to create an operation that goes beyond the simple production of olive oil.



The resulting initiative is based around the shiny machines of their state-of-the-art olive press, with its puzzling array of vats, moving belts and bewildering ancillary apparatus. The environment, in the air and underfoot, has none of the oleaginous qualities you normally experience in a working olive press, although I suspect the situation may change when the olive harvest gets underway next month.

A spotless environment is necessary, since during the tourist season the furloughed press is part of an 'olive adventure' that starts with the Mavroudis Family Museum, passes through the modern press and concludes seamlessly in a shop selling Mavroudis brand olive oil and other local products.



The Museum is housed in a huge stone building adjacent to the press, and aims to present the history of olive pressing on the island. Carefully collected and curated over many years from roadsides and redundant mills, the exhibits are displayed chronologically to demonstrate the development of olive press machinery, from the primitive single stone grinders with their accompanying wooden screw presses, through to the basic mechanical presses of the mid-20th century. The brothers, who act as your expert guides through the museum, have left a space where they hope soon to set up the replica of an Ancient Greek press uncovered recently in Attica.

By way of a massive portal, you then access modern times, where your guide takes you through the slick process of olive production as it's carried out today. And on to the final product, Mavroudis olive oil itself.

Don't expect a single item in different-sized packages. The oil comes not only in different grades, from salad-friendly Extra Virgin (at the very low end of acidity) to less delicate oil for deep-frying your chips, but also with various flavourings. The Mavroudis family has developed a process for melding the oil with other natural ingredients to create a range of super-gourmet edibles:

- Olive oil with basil - great on summer tomato salads.
- Olive oil with lemon - for marinating your fish before grilling.
- Olive oil with orange - a dip for your breakfast toast.
- Olive oil with oregano - another for salads and marinades.
- Olive oil with chilli - sold out. Drat!

We tasted them all with supplied niblets of bread, and came away with an armful - at less than normal supermarket prices.

The days are disappearing when local families (like mine) mistreated their olives both in cultivation and harvesting, with the result that the oil's acidity rendered it almost poisonous. The days when Corfu's olive oil was regarded with disdain, in the same way as Greek wines used to be. In contrast, today's oil is typified by a swathe of awards that Mavroudis olive products have won at international exhibitions, testifying to the accelerating transformation of the industry.

And another transformation: producers like Mavroudis are recognising that, by diversifying their business models with initiatives like this Museum, they can both contribute to tourism and profit from it.

The Mavroudis Family Museum, Olive Mill and Brand Shop are located roadside on the main highway south, just after the village of Vranganiotika, about five minutes from Messongi. It is open Monday to Saturday 08.30-20.00 and Sunday 09.00-13.00. They also have a shop in Moraitika.

The mussels have escaped!

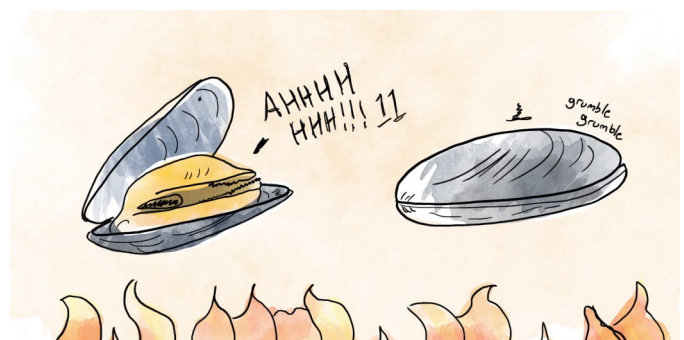
JUST DOWN THE COAST FROM MORAITIKA, the fishing harbour of Boukari is one of the island's top fish-foodie locations - at prices vastly lower than in tavernas along the over-hyped North East Coast. Greek Odyssey - A Trip to the Mainland

Since coming to live on this wonderful island, we (my wife Chris and I) have explored so much of Corfu and areas close by on the mainland.

But an opportunity arose for us to extend our travels a bit further afield.

A relative had agreed to come and house sit for us and look after the dog, chickens etc!

And having stayed in Stoupa, (just south of Kalamata on the Peloponnese) a few years ago and always wanting to go back and explore the region and its history, we decided to start making plans to revisit the area.

So, in mid Sept we got an early morning ferry to Igoumenitsa and we were off!

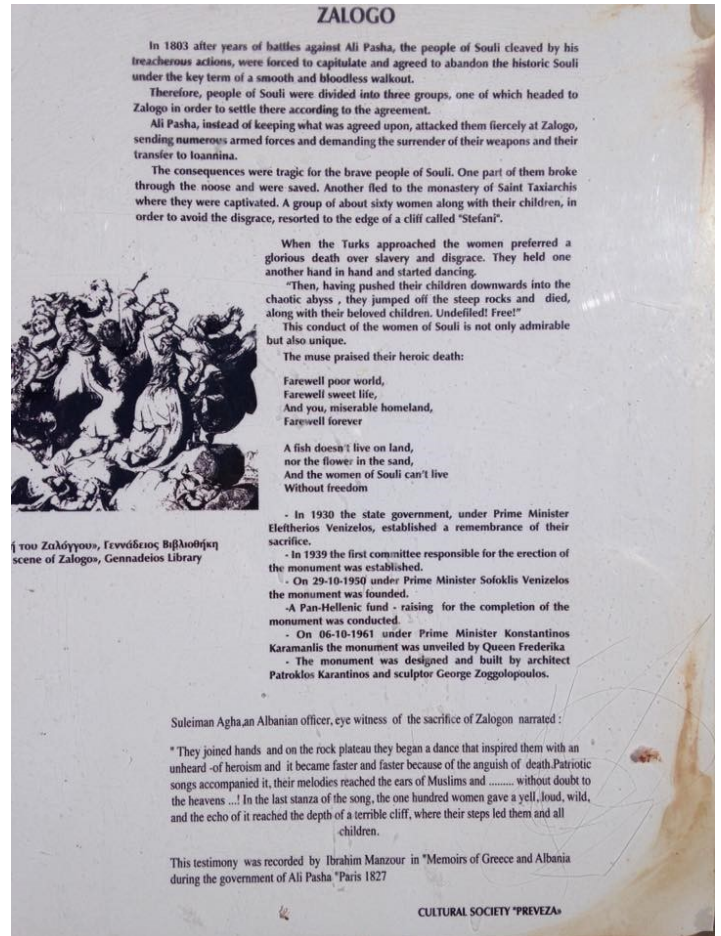
We had planned our first overnight stay in Lefkada on our way down South to the Peloponnese.

But on the way to Lefkada we passed quite close to the monument of Zalongo,

which was erected to commemorate the "Dance of Zalongo", a mass suicide of women and children in 1803 to avoid being captured by the advancing Turkish armies.

The monies for the monument came due to a request from the Mayor of Preveza to other local mayors, the bulk of the fundraising was done via local schools and 500,000 drachmas was raised to allow the monument to be constructed.

So, a slight detour took us to the Saint Dimitrios Monastery at the base of the cliff on which the monument to the women and children of the village of Souli is sited.

After a 700-meter climb, we were at the site of the monument, very, very atmospheric, sobering but amazingly beautiful at the same time.

The silence was as stunning as were the views across to the islands of Lefkada, Cephalonia and Zakynthos.

Wow!

Then onwards to Lefkada, where we spent a relaxing day and a wonderful night exploring bustling Lefkada town, the harbour still very full of yachts, boats and town full of passengers and crews.

Next day we drove to Messolonghi, which is famous for being the site of a heroic battle and siege during the Greek civil war for independence.

We purposely avoided the main roads or motorway and kept to the old coast roads, and so glad we did, the views were absolutely stunning and will stay with me for a long time, we kept stopping for “photo opportunities” and they were endless, amazing.

We arrived in Messolonghi or Hiera Polis (the sacred city) as it is known, which is unique among other Greek cities for the heroics of its inhabitants.

Lord Byron, who fought alongside the Greeks during the war, died at the battle of Messolonghi in 1824 of an illness caused through injuries picked up in the battle.

Lord Byron’s heart is preserved inside a cenotaph topped by his statue in the town square.

As locals tell the tale, the fortress was surrounded by Turkish armies and after the occupants were running short of food, water and ammunition, decided to use the remaining gunpowder to blow themselves up and some of the advancing Turks rather than surrender.

Look it up!

The site of the old fortress has been turned in to a garden of remembrance called “The Garden of Hero’s” beautifully manicured lawns and amazing statues to the Heroes who gave their lives.

There is a particular monument that is made up of the remains of old bits of cannons, cannon balls and bits of stone from the original fortress that was blown up! Wow.

The town of Messolonghi itself was a lively and pretty town, especially at night time, as with most Greek towns, it comes alive with couples and families enjoying the cool evenings, we spent a nice couple of hours strolling around the town and were amazed, although you could see that people were struggling with the recession- the place was immaculate, no litter anywhere.

Wandering along the side streets we could hear a noise, it sounded like someone had their TV turned up too much.

Turning the corner, there was an outside cinema and it was showing the "Downton Abbey" movie!

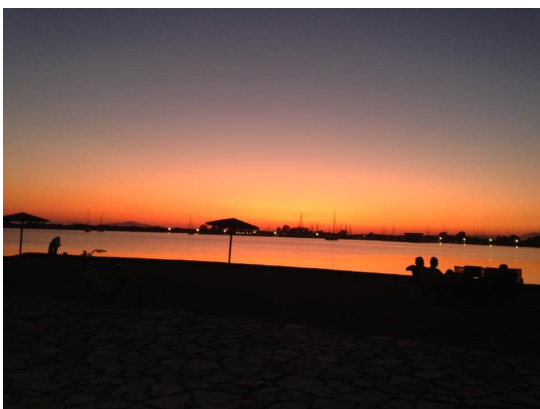
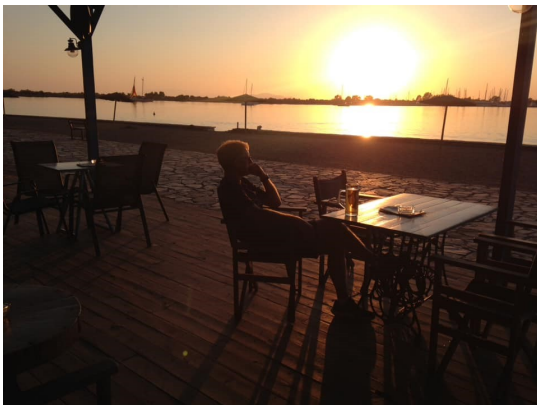
We peeped through the partially open doors and it was amazing to see the interior of the place, and the amount of people who were watching, wonderful!

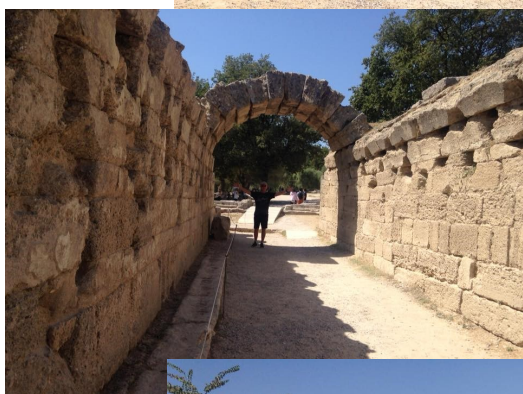
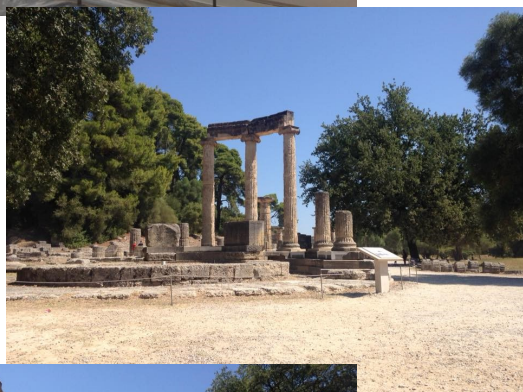
Late that afternoon we arrived in Pilos, a very pretty little town on the Ionian coast line in the area of Messinia.

Toss of a coin and mountain route it was and boy were we glad we did, it was most probably one of the most amazing roads I have ever driven along, amazing views and terrain, problem was it took us nearly two hours to complete as we kept stopping to admire the stunning views.

We arrived at the ancient abandoned city of Mystras, which covers a whole hill side, the town (for the common folk) is close to the bottom of the hill and accessed via fortified walls and old gateway.

Halfway up the hill is a citadel which was occupied by the gentry and further up the hill to the top is a fortress where the higher beings lived, overseeing the people below.

Again, we could have spent the whole day there and a four-hour visit did not do it justice!

But would recommend a visit if you ever happen to be "just passing!?"

Off to the city of Sparta for an overnight stay before heading to Ancient Sparta tomorrow morning for a visit!

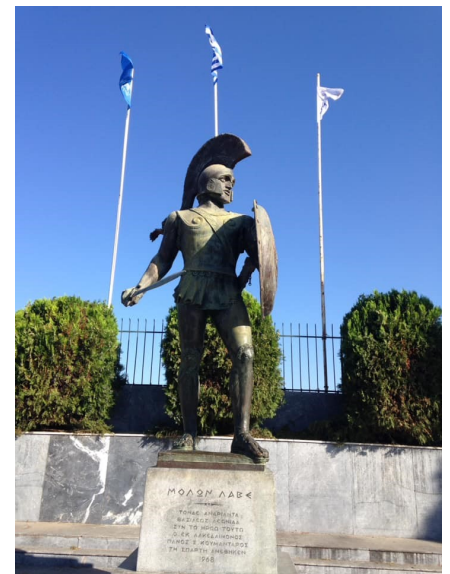

Nice coastal drive (again avoiding main roads) to pretty town of Nafplion, which sits in a bay on the Argolic Gulf, just below the city of Argos.

Chris wanted to nip in and get the winter catalogue but I told her it wasn't out yet!

Nafplion is a pretty, pretty place, still very busy and we could understand why, lovely open spaces and side streets and alley ways full of traditional houses, shops, cafes etc.

Again, found a nice traditional taverna in a side street just off the town square, wonderful food and very reasonable prices.

Again, would highly recommend a visit.

The plan for the next day was to start making our way back along the Peloponnese but on the Corinthian coast side.

We had booked our last overnight stay at the little coastal town of Akrata, about a third of the way along the coast after the city of Corinth.

So, leaving Nafplion we headed for the city of Corinth and to spend the morning touring its sights and to see the Corinth Canal.

The canal was and is quite a sight, must have been some effort to excavate.

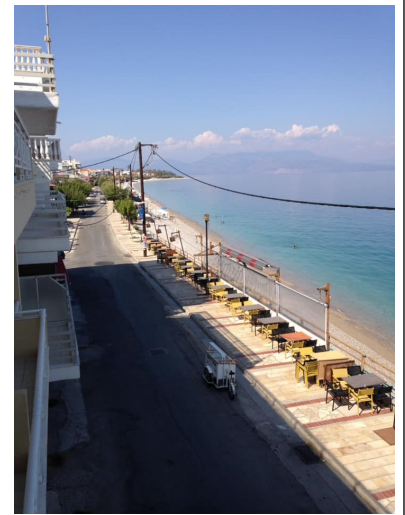

We had a relaxing evening stroll along the seafront and found a little beach front tavern and enjoyed a nice meal watching a magnificent red moon rise over the mountains on the far side of the Gulf of Corinth.

So, we enquired if there was another petrol station close by, they told us there was but "go and get some pastries and sit and have coffee with us and we will tell you"

So, returning to the coffee bar armed with our breakfast we ordered coffee and sat with couple of locals who were enjoying the morning and watching the world go by.

We entered into conversation with an old guy called Vasilis, who it turned out was born in Akrata but emigrated to Australia 60 yrs ago and now at the age of 76 comes back to his apartment by the beach for 2 months every year to visit family, friends and catch up on village news.

We explained that we now lived on Corfu and we were "on tour" and proceeded to tell him where our travels had taken us.

Vasilis then started to tell us about his life and how he came to move to Australia, then impressed us with his knowledge of Ancient Greek history, he kept us captivated for almost an hour with his knowledge of all the things the Greeks have given to the world and the exploits of Alexander the Great.

If you have ever watched the movie “My Big Fat Greek Wedding” remember the father?

Who was so proud of being Greek and everything that was Greek also convinced that he was related to Alexandre the Great?

That was Vasilis!

We eventually managed to extricate from him that there was another petrol station just a few kilometres up the road.

We said our goodbyes and walked away smiling and bursting with knowledge from our Greek history lesson from Vasilis.

Car topped up with petrol we made our way on to the A5 motorway, heading north towards Igouminitsa, back over the Rio Bridge, 3 hours later and the wallet 45 euros lighter from motorway and bridge tolls we arrived at Igoumenitsa.

90 min ferry ride and we were back home on Corfu.



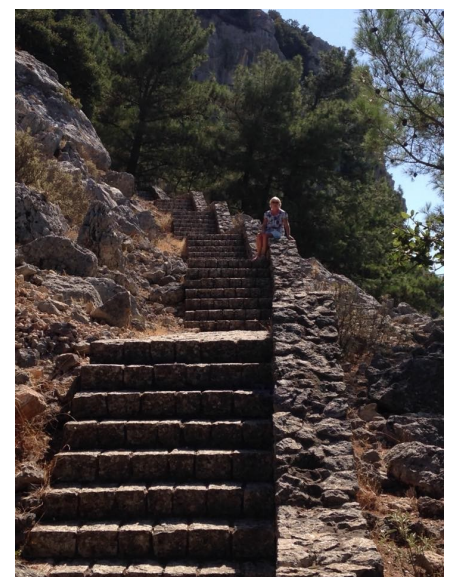

Few observations from our travels,

- Not sure if it was because of the recent refuse issues on Corfu but one thing that hit us was just how clean the towns and cities we visited were, you could see just how much the economic issues had hit people hard but hardly any mess anywhere!

- Just how much the people of the towns and cities love their squares and open spaces and make so much more use of them particularly of an evening time.
- So many people riding bicycles, older people, families and children in particular, nice to see.
- Prices in most areas were a lot less than on Corfu, petrol could be found for 1.49 euros and average price of 1.55 euros in most places.
- Condition of roads were so much better and you could see the results of investment on the infrastructure.
- Price of eating out in restaurants and tavernas were certainly far more reasonable but as usual, in the tourist spots prices were about the same as on Corfu.
- Due to the size of the country roads were far less congested and there appeared to be far more road courtesy.
- Driving around, particularly in the interior of Greece, there were vast swathes of nothing which made you realise how small the population of Greece is compared to the size of the country.
- And it was only on our last night, sitting on our balcony enjoying an Ouzo or two that I spotted a plane high up glistening in the evening sun did I realise just how few planes we had seen on our travels, with Corfu being a top tourist destination you do not realise just how many aircraft we have visiting/ leaving the island and the noise pollution from them! Particularly where we live in central Corfu.

But despite all of the above, it's Corfu for me despite its peccadillos and just a short ferry ride away you have the whole of Greece just waiting for you!

Guitar strings:

Well, there must be over 100 brands on the market, every musician has his favourite make. Most of the brands nowadays have several price breaks, be it multi packets or single; the gauges don't really influence the price, just if they are coated with antirust type coatings- that bumps up the cost.

So, what gauge? 8s 9s 10s 11s or 12s if you're really brave and have fingers like concrete!!!

Most common is 9 gauge with light or heavy; top gauges 48 to 54. Some players prefer to mix a hybrid of gauges together, my preference as well, but you need to find a supplier that sells single strings, such as are available from my Samsung Galaxy smartphone. This is obviously aimed at the novice player but we all find a brand that suits us with experience. On how long they last the general rule would be two weeks of heavy playing every night but most pro players will change a set every performance. Lucky them I here you say, but most pro players get free strings if they advertise for them. So, stick to a new set every two weeks, a good way to keep them fresh is to wipe over your strings with a light spray of wd 40 on a rag. Works wonders! We only sell a couple of brands here at Roadhouse; Ernie Ball and Dean Markley, both are

affordable, good middle of the road quality. All sets are 5 Euros a set by 10 sets and it will cost you 42 euros.

The next stage of hardware for your strings would be the type of tuner fitted to your guitar!! Well, we have very good, good, and just bloody useless. Unfortunately, if your guitar is made in China and cost you less than 150 euros the chances of them needing to be changed is high!! Really nothing worse than a guitar that doesn't hold tuning. Don't worry it's a way fix but the bushing holes do vary from 8mm to 10 mm so be sure to measure beforehand on choice of tuner (machine head is another word). Again, we have some very good units from 30 euros to 80 euros, all tested on gigging guitars that get played.

Thanks for reading this far.

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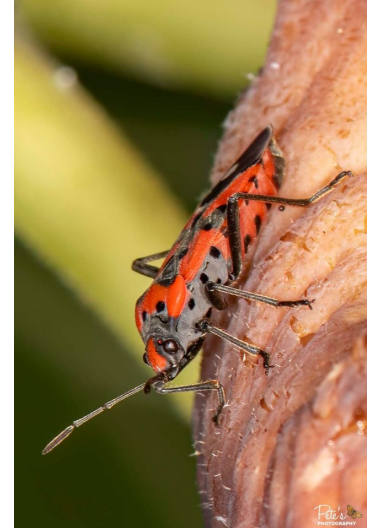
Nature

I do not know *anybody* on Corfu better qualified to explain in depth the intricacies of the Corfu Trail than Hilary Papeiti.

After, all, she created it. She is the real deal.

Here was an interesting Q and A session between an enquirer for Armeni Cottage and our office, which Hilary has responded to here in full.

Her expertise in this area brings the customer to the point of 'willing to buy'. After that it is our responsibility to check out the pedigree of the property, the building constraints and regulations.

Between these banks of knowledge and experience we believe we can put you on the right track without it costing you an 'arm and a leg'.

1) Are you involved in the trail? Also do you know Giannades and this property at all? If you do what are your thoughts?

Yes, I actually created the Corfu Trail in 2001 and still oversee it.

I know Giannades very well indeed as I live about three miles away, and shop, walk and dine there frequently. As far as the Trail is concerned, Giannades is a perfect overnight place for independent hikers who are not tied to a tour operator's stopover program. It has an EXCELLENT village store with a big freezer section (rare in village shops), fresh produce and its own-label ecological olive oil (made by the owner's dad). The shop also acts as the local post office. The village also has a butcher's shop, and two other small village stores, plus a bakery/patisserie/cafe and two tavernas, one a top-class grill place in the village square, and the other a very well-regarded gastropub outside the village. The village also has a good bus service into Corfu Town, and fast broadband internet. The village square has the most amazing view of any in the whole of Corfu, looking out across the Ropa Valley to the Mainland and the Pantokrator mountain range.

2) I'm a great lover of Provence. Is there any history to this olive press...? How old is it? I read that the Armenia are an old family that farm there.... Any relation. What interesting things are there...? Any more pics of it?

Please note that the olive press equipment has long been removed. Yes, this house belongs to a branch of the Armenia family, the current owner having been raised there. I would have to ask about the history/date of the house. It is very difficult to know how old it is as houses were still being built in villages up to the 1960s in the old style, so they look the same as houses much older. It's easy to make an enquiry as the said owner lives next door to me! Her brother, Giorgos Armenia, is the owner of the village square grill room mentioned above. I have no more pictures that are worth sending as like many village houses it is very difficult to photograph, being surrounded closely by other houses.

3) Apparently Giannades has an old and new section... Is this part of the old section? Is it in a good area of the town and are the building around it old and historic? We are looking for historic architecture and surroundings?

The house is definitely in the 'old' part of the village, settled, I am told, in Medieval times, when the village was relocated from a sea-facing ridge due to danger of pirate attacks. The house is directly on the Trail and only a minute's walk from the village square with its shops etc. The surrounding houses are a mix of old and unrenovated, old and renovated to look new, and more recently built houses. The village's most historic house is a very short walk away.

4) The write up mentions a large storage space off the slope of the roof. Could this be converted for additional space? What would be the maximum floor space we could attain on this place?

Even if we went up a storey Paul would have to see the property to answer this question. I am not a builder, but just have ideas that have to be translated into 'possible' or 'not possible' by an expert. I do not know, for example, whether planning regulations allow a third floor, though some raising of the roof for a mezzanine floor might be possible. Additionally, be aware that there has been no topographical survey done on the property, so measurements are estimates.

5) Is it directly on the Corfu trail any chance he could show on Google maps where the property is?

Attached is a Google Earth image of Giannades. Armeni Cottage is in the lower left quadrant, just above the 'h' of 'Earth' and slightly to the right of it, close to the visible road. It is part of the larger building shown.

Simon's World

The Project Nettie statement:

“Biological sex” is a scientific description of the reproductive anatomies that have evolved to fulfil the function of sexual reproduction. Biological sex exists independently of humans and society.

In mammals, there are two types of gamete and two classes of reproductive anatomy. The male sex class produces many small motile gametes – sperm – for transfer. The female sex class produces few large immobile gametes – ova – and gestates/delivers live young. In any individual, reproductive anatomy is almost always unambiguously male or female and observed correctly at birth, regardless of ultimate sexual function or dysfunction.

Male and female reproductive anatomies differ qualitatively, not quantitatively, and there are no intrinsically-ordered states between male and female reproductive anatomies. Biological sex does not meet the defining criteria for a spectrum.

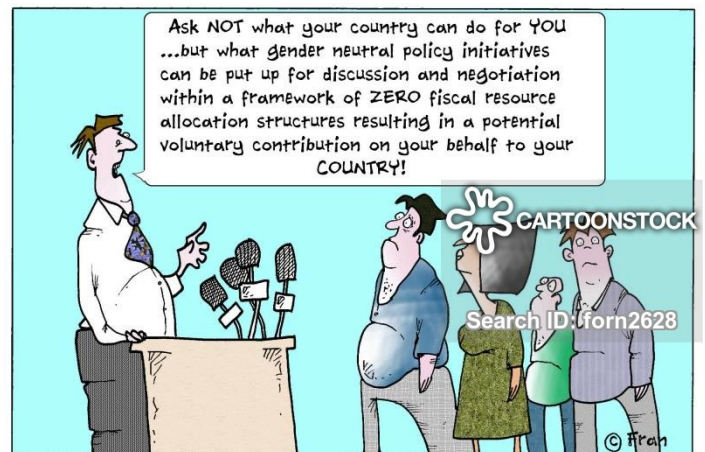
Although rare, some individuals have disorders of sex development (also referred to as intersex conditions). Most of these disorders are male or female specific and do not cause ambiguous biological sex. Some individuals have reproductive anatomies with both male and female features; here, biological sex classification is a complex process with input from medical professionals and parents. Not one of these individuals represents an additional sex class.

Reproductive anatomies differentiate and mature under the control of genetic and hormonal signals, and measurements of these factors have strong predictive power, but do not define the sex of an individual. Biological sex is fundamentally defined by male and female reproductive anatomy.

Attempts to recast biological sex as a social construct, which then becomes a matter of chosen individual identity, are wholly ideological, scientifically inaccurate and socially irresponsible.

What is Project Nettie? Project Nettie is an online and regularly updated record of scientists, medics and those in related disciplines who, by signing their support for the Project Nettie statement (below), assert the material reality of biological sex and reject attempts to reframe it as a malleable social construct.
